

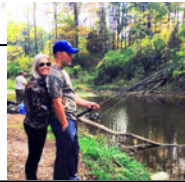

Lake Huron – Salmon Population History
A Lake Huron salmon and trout fact sheet

What caused the Chinook salmon population to crash?

Salmon were stocked in the late 1960s to eat the over-abundant invasive alewives that were littering Great Lakes beaches by the billions. Management of salmon was easy at first; as more were stocked, anglers caught more and a world-class fishery was created. This changed dramatically nearly 15 years ago, and numbers stocked did not equate to numbers caught. Over time, the alewife numbers declined first in Lake Huron hitting historic lows by 2004 followed by historic lows in Lake Michigan by 2014.

Alewives have declined because they are losing the battle with quagga and zebra mussels for the same nutrients in the lake (they invaded the Great Lakes in the mid-1990s). Also, high stocking rates and increases in Chinook salmon natural reproduction in the 1990s through the 2000s were responsible for very high predation on an already unstable alewife population.

What can we expect for Lake Huron salmon in the future?

The combination of increased salmon predation and the competition from quagga and zebra mussels has squeezed the alewife population from the top and bottom. Current Lake Huron salmon stocking is designed to maintain adult returns to the Swan River Weir for sport and tribal fisheries, and to maintain fall fisheries in a few select locations. However, the food web is continuing to change, so managers and anglers will need to continue to work together to better balance our critical salmon and trout fishery.

Lake Michigan Could Best Support Lake Trout and Steelhead

Invasive mussels and fewer Nutrients from tributaries have altered the Lake Michigan ecosystem, making it more conducive to the stocking of lake trout and steelhead than Chinook salmon, according to a recent USGS and Michigan State U. Study.

Reduced stocking of Chinook salmon, however, would still Support a substantial population of this highly desirable recreational salmon species, which is a large contributor to the Great Lakes multi-billion-dollar recreational fishery.

2017 Spring Creek Update:

The Hepworth Anglers Club (HAC) is in the midst of its fifth year of Spring Creek Fish fish habitat restoration work. Temporary deployment of a series of portable timber mats and cradles, as shown in the photos, provides access for equipment and habitat restoration materials, while protecting the stream banks, trees and existing in channel structure.



The project contractor is Tom MacDonald Excavating and the team includes equipment operators John Warwood and Sheldon Roote, student Trevor Hood, HAC members, stream restoration specialist Chris Cummings of Matrix/Parish Aquatics, Dr. James Hamilton and students of Wilfrid Laurier University, with support from various other organizations and individuals.

This year's work includes embedding cedar tree root wads and crowns into the stream bank to create cover, habitat complexity and local scouring, creating and enhancing spawning shoals and riffles by placing boulders and angular spawning stone in strategic locations, installing cedar log "lunkers" to create undercut banks for refuge habitat and planting riparian shrubs to create overhanging cover and stabilize banks. In addition, four side channels have been restored to increase rearing and nursery habitat. Physical aeration and cover structures using natural wood materials will be installed in other side channels. Also a jump pool below an old mill dam will be restored to enhance fish passage to and from upstream spawning and nursery areas.

Funding for this year's work was received from the Recreational Fisheries Conservation Partnerships Program (Fisheries and Oceans Canada) and the Land Stewardship and Habitat Restoration

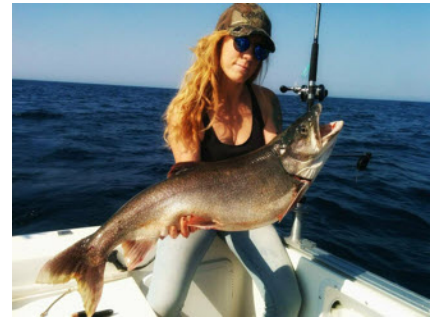
I always enjoy the fishing but even more so, meeting the anglers and supporters of the derby while serving fish at the Fish Fry where we serve over 5000 people! WHOA!

Ontario Continuing Fight Against Invasive Species

Province Working With Partners to Create Awareness of Invasive Species and Protect the Environment
August 16, 2017 2:00 P.M. Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry

Ontario continues to combat invasive plants and animals in order to protect the environment and allow people across the province to continue to enjoy rivers, lakes, parks and other green spaces.

Kathryn McGarry, Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry and Jeff Leal, MPP for Peterborough, were in Peterborough today to announce a number of new investments in programs to combat invasive species.

New investments this year include:

Support for the Invasive Species Centre's work to further research into new biological control agents for phragmites and dog-strangling vine

Additional support for the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters (OFAH) Invading Species Awareness Program - which is marking its 25th anniversary - to strengthen the reporting invading species hotline, online tracking system and mobile application, management and eradication of water soldier in the Trent-Severn Waterway as well as public outreach initiatives

New funding for the Ontario Invasive Plant Council so they can engage municipalities in the development of municipal invasive plant management strategies

Support for the Federation of Ontario Cottagers' Associations and their work with lake front property owners to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species, including A Shoreline Owner's Guide to Invasive Species

Ontario will continue to support the successful implementation of the Invasive Species Act and regulation through public education and working with neighbouring jurisdictions.

Creating awareness of invasive species and protecting our environment is part of our plan to create jobs, grow our economy and help people in their everyday lives.

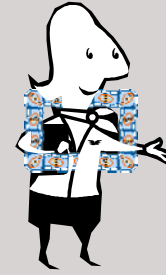

Non-native species slowly spreading throughout Canada's Ontario province

Step aside zebra mussels and phragmites, another foreign invader is lurking beneath the surface of Southwestern Ontario's lakes and streams—a little umbrella-shaped creature that's making people who see it do a double take. They're freshwater jellyfish, a non-native species that's been spotted in Port Dover, Welland, Fort Erie and in lakes and streams across Central Ontario. The small and slimy translucent animals are a rare sight, but clearly they're here to stay.

"There's no known way to remove freshwater jellyfish from a lake ecosystem once it is there," said Jeff Brinsmead, senior invasive species biologist with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry.

Quick Facts

For 2016-17, Ontario is investing \$1.6 million in invasive species partnerships.

Ontario provides annual support to the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters to deliver the Invading Species Awareness Program to track invasive species sightings and provide public education and outreach.

Invasive species often out-compete native species for food and take over their habitats, threatening both the environment and economy. In 2016, Ontario prohibited and restricted 19 invasive species to prevent their arrival, control their spread in the province and protect the environment.

RANGE REPORT - SHOOTING SPORTS

Well summer is officially over, and things are busy on most of the ranges. This is an exciting time of year with Moose, Deer, Waterfowl, and Upland bird seasons about to begin. So let me give you a brief update on what is happening or happened on the ranges this fall.

Range #1 - Handgun range: Some of the brush was cut back and a work party was in and repaired the wooden structure in the bullet catch. Then the entire bullet stop was re sanded and all holes filled in. It's in tip top shape for fall, more info to come on possible improvements to the structure.

Range #2 - Rimfire/CBA: Here as well there has been a general clean-up and refurbishing of the backstops and target holders. The bullet catch has had more sand added and positioned to the proper angle. The brush was also cut back where needed and trimming of the vegetation on the backstop was completed. A motion activated solar powered light will be installed on this range within the next couple of weeks.

Range #3 - 100 yard Range: Work on the backstops, filling in the cavities, refurbishing and replacing many of the sandbags has been completed. The target backers and frames have also been replaced were it was necessary. In the not too distant future we will be replacing the pea gravel filled wall which separates this range from the Skeet range. We will probably just be putting up a wall on the end of the 100 yard structure and using a fence to prohibit entry to the range from the skeet area. The vegetation on the main bullet catch (high berm) has yet to be trimmed, so any volunteers for this duty are welcomed, just call me and I'll set it up. Refer to the web-site calendar, our monthly schedule or the one at the range for all the times and dates this range is open.

Range #4 - Single Trap Field: Nothing too much to report here, range is in good shape.

Range #5 - Sporting Clays: This new range is working out fantastically. Many great reports and certainly lots of usage. Each time I shoot it there seems to be something new to make the round even more enjoyable. The trampoline bounce and the new rabbit run certainly got my attention and I actually hit a few of them. The inclement weather earlier in the season cut back on some of the participation, however the last month or so has been great and it is keeping everyone very busy. Make sure you keep an eye on our web-site calendar and newsletter to know the exact sporting clay shoot dates for the rest of the season.

Range #6 - Skeet Field/Trap Field: This field is seeing more use this year than it ever has, we have had some great turnouts. Not too much new to report for this fall, range is good shape and is being maintained.

Archery Practice Facility: This area got a general clean up about a month ago and some new carpeting installed. We put out three 3D targets for the last Ladies Range Day and left them out for our members to use. They will be there until Nov. or the first snowfall.

Archery Walk-through Range: We have cleared the windfalls, trimmed the lanes and refurbished or replaced the old butts. We also did some work on smoothing out the trails and making them easier to walk on for our members. Last week we put out 16 of the 3D targets for your usage, prior the hunting season. They will be taken back in just before the snow flies, like the ones down on the practice range.

Reminder on Guest Fees: Just a quick reminder that a \$5,00 charge is applicable to all guest you bring over the age of 16. (children 16 years old or younger are free). On ranges #1 and #2 it is on the honour system and the fees are to be deposited in the donations boxes at those ranges. At Range #3 the acting RSO will collect and deposit this fee in the donation box at the time of sign-in. This doesn't apply to the shotgun ranges as they have a different method. (Full details can be found in the Range Rules Manual)
